

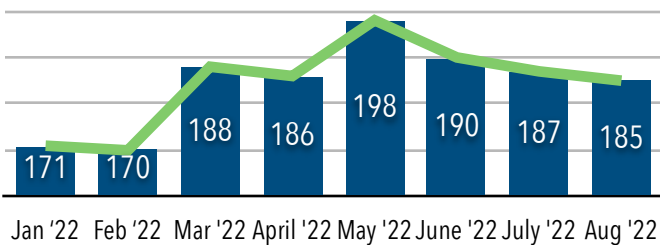

WORK RELEASE UPDATES:

Monthly Clients Served 8 Month Trend



We currently have 26 work release residents and continue to limit the population due to COVID-19 restrictions, but will remain with an increased capacity of 25-30 residents. This past month the agency had no residents or employees test positive for COVID-19.

The facility is still in the process of having the roof replaced, completion date not known. Current plans are that interior renovations will begin in January with an estimated renovation completion date of late spring/early summer of 2023. The female work release dorm continues to remain closed until that time.

AUGUST OVERVIEW:

Community Corrections served a total of 185 clients, a 1.5% decrease: 34 via the Work Release Program and 151 via the Home Detention/Electronic Monitoring program for a total of 5,160 days supervised.

The department received 15 new clients in August:

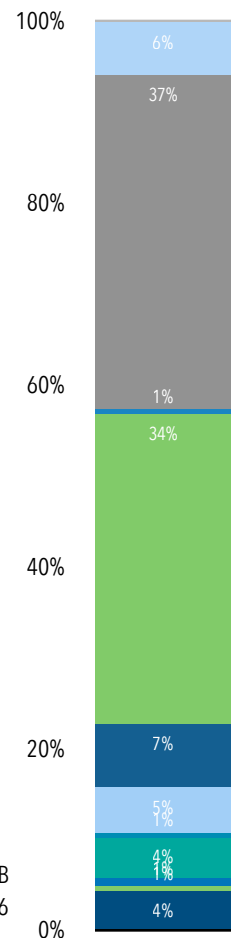
- 7 Level 6 Felonies or Class D Felonies
- 6 High Level Felonies (Lvl 5 & Above)
- 2 Misdemeanors
- 2 Juveniles

20 clients successfully completed the program, while 8 clients were returned to either the Cass or Pulaski County Jail on a pending violation. 21 defendants were interviewed and evaluated for potential participation in CPCC. The Cass County Jail Analysis continues to show an substantial amount of inmates held on Lvl 6 Executed Terms, 69% (39 inmates). In response, the department continues to increase evaluations for possible modification to community corrections before release into the community.

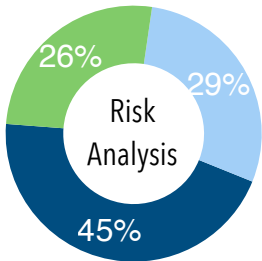

POPULATION ANALYSIS:

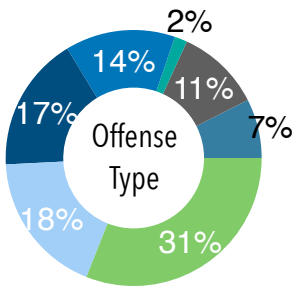
- 34 Work Release Clients
- 151 Home Detention Clients
- 21 Clients participated in Work Crew; completing 384 hours, including water crew, set-up at the Taste of Cass County, and work at the 4DR Recovery House
- 14 CTP Clients
- 37 Courtesy Transfers
- 129 clients were serving a term originating from Cass County, while 39 were serving a sentence from Pulaski County
- 11 clients were participating in Juvenile GPS Monitoring

Risk Analysis: Analysis shows that 26% of clients served in July were identified through the IRAS Community Supervision Tool or IYAS as High Risk to Very High Risk, 48% as Moderate Risk, and 29% as Low Risk.



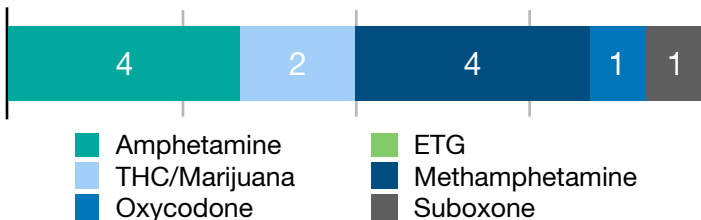

Offense Type Analysis: Analysis shows that 31% of offenses are drug and alcohol related, 18% are traffic offenses, 17% are crimes against persons, 14% property related, 2% weapon related, 11% public health and admin., and 7% fall into the other category

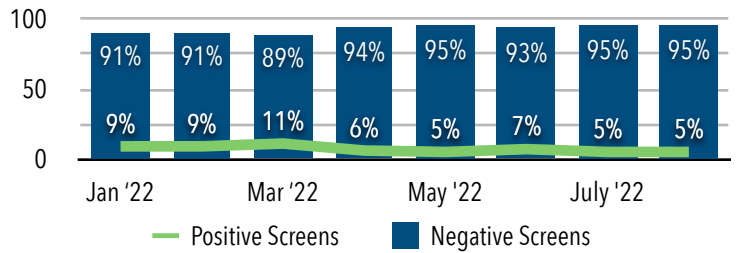
DRUG SCREEN ANALYSIS:

Positive Screens by Drug

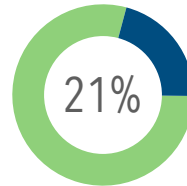


Percent Positive Screens 8 Month Trend

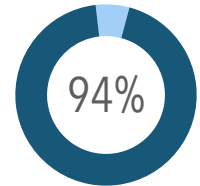


PERFORMANCE METRICS:

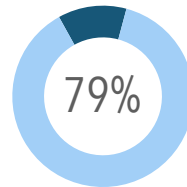
At the direction of our local JRAC the agency is now tracking the following performance metrics.



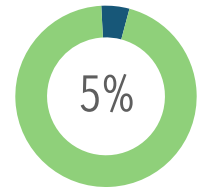
Violation Rate: the percentage of clients who received a violation; pending violations are NOT included; this is a measure of closed cases.



Safety Rate: the percentage of clients who do not commit a new offense while under supervision; this is a measure of closed cases.



Completion Rate: the percentage of clients who remain under supervision until the end of their sentence.



Drug Screen Positivity Rate: the percentage of drug screens administered that return a positive result

NOTABLE UPDATES:

- With the help of our local JRAC, Prosecutors, Judges and Advisory Board, CPCC entered into an MOU with the Sheriff to allow for normal sentencing procedure to continue with Russell v State.
- The Agency completed its CY21 IDOC Fiscal Audit, results pending, in addition to submitting the CY23 County Budgets.
- Work continues on updating policy and improving quality assurance measures to prepare for the upcoming audit and improve operations and services provided to clients.
