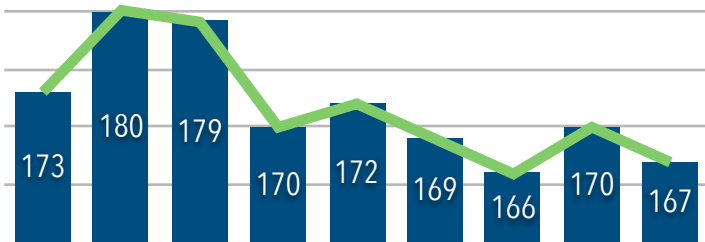

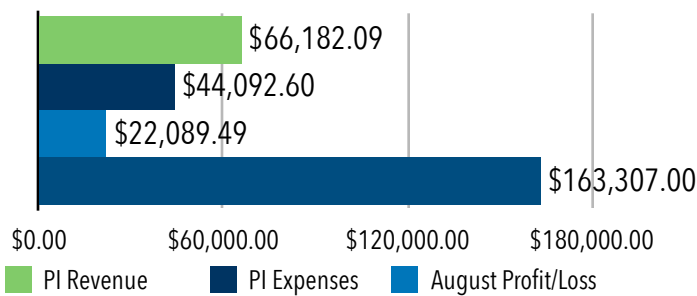
Monthly Clients Served 9 Month Trend

WORK RELEASE UPDATES:

There currently are 32 work release residents: 26 males and 6 females, a 11% decrease from last month. Community Corrections is collaborating with Court Services to increase residential therapeutic services.



MONTHLY FINANCIAL OVERVIEW:

SEPTEMBER OVERVIEW:

Community Corrections served a total of 170 clients in September: 44 via the Work Release Program and 126 via the Home Detention/Electronic Monitoring Program for a total of 4,594 days supervised. It is noted that 19

clients have been transferred to other jurisdictions for supervision. The average daily Work Release Population was 44, while the average for Home Detention was 100.

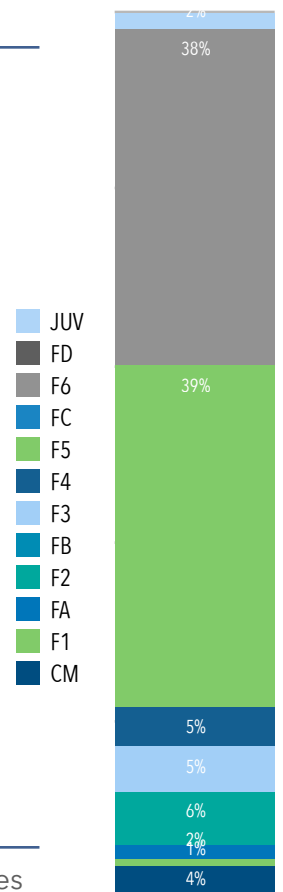
The department received 22 new clients in September:

- 9 Level 6 Felonies
- 11 High Level Felonies (Lvl 5 & Above)
- 0 Criminal Misdemeanors
- 2 Juvenile GPS Supervision

12 clients successfully completed the program, while 7 clients were returned to either the Cass or Pulaski County Jail on a pending violation, with 16 held in the CCJ on pending violations.

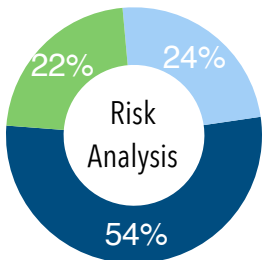

POPULATION ANALYSIS:

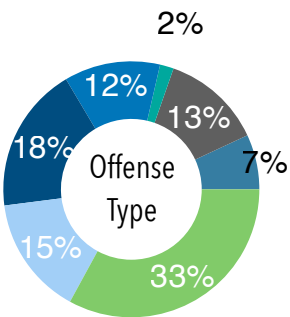
- 51 Work Release Clients
- 120 Home Detention Clients
- Approximately 15 Clients participated in Work Crew; working on projects including watering, trash removal & helping with The Taste of Cass County
- 4 CTP Clients
- 30 Courtesy Transfers
- 135 clients were serving a term originating from Cass County, while 35 were serving a sentence from Pulaski County
- 4 clients participated in Juvenile GPS Monitoring

RISK & OFFENSE TYPE ANALYSIS:



- High
- Low
- Moderate

Risk Analysis: Analysis shows that 22% of clients served in September were identified through the IRAS Community Supervision Tool or IYAS as High Risk to Very High Risk, 54% as Moderate Risk, and 22% as Low Risk, with an average risk reduction of -62%.

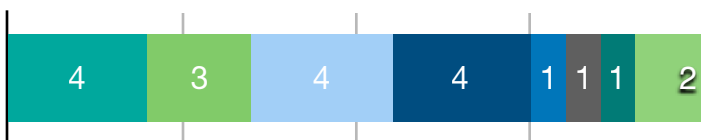
Offense Type Analysis:

Analysis shows that 33% of offenses are drug and alcohol related, 15% are traffic offenses, 18% are crimes against persons, 12% property related, 2% weapon related, 13% public health and admin., and 7% fall into the other category.

DRUG SCREEN ANALYSIS:

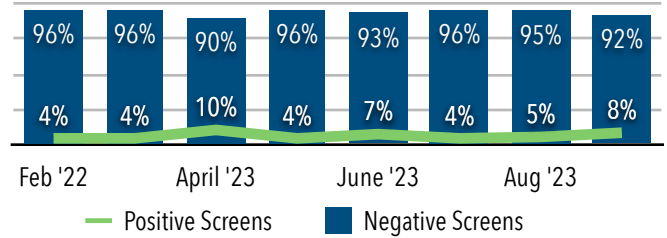
Out of 171 drugs screens administered this month, 8%, were positive. The majority of positive screens were for amp/meth, THC & ETG (Alcohol).

Positive Screens by Drug



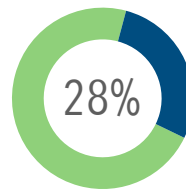
- Amphetamine

Percent Positive Screens 8 Month Trend

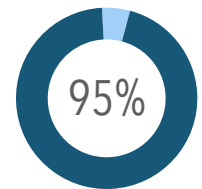


PERFORMANCE METRICS:

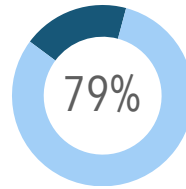
At the direction of our local JRAC, the agency is now tracking the following performance metrics.



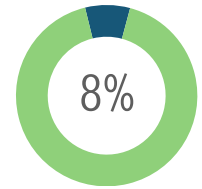
Violation Rate: the percentage of clients who received a violation; pending violations are NOT included; this is a measure of closed cases.



Safety Rate: the percentage of clients who do not commit a new offense while under supervision; this is a measure of closed cases.



Completion Rate: the percentage of clients who remain under supervision until the end of their sentence.



Drug Screen Positivity Rate: the percentage of drug screens administered that return a positive result

NOTABLE UPDATES:

- CPCC continues to partner with Court Services on applying for supplemental grant funding and the goal of transitioning to a more therapeutic based model.
- CPCC will partner further with Court Services to expand staff training and learning teams. Topics include Core Correctional Practices, Skill-Building and SEA 9.
- We continue to work on furnishing office space and installation of technology in the classrooms to complete renovations.
