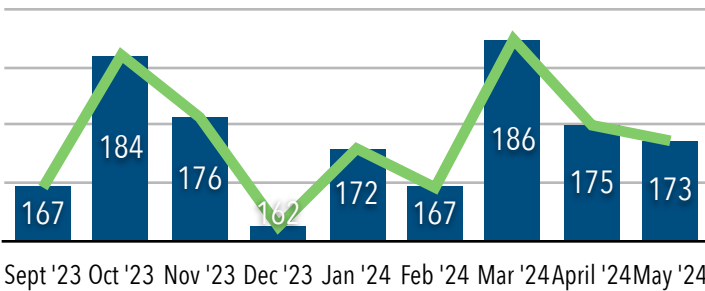

CASS/PULASKI COMMUNITY CORRECTIONS

Program for a total of 4,757 days supervised. It is noted that 17 clients have been transferred to other jurisdictions for supervision. The average daily Work Release Population was 40, while the average for Home Detention was 113.

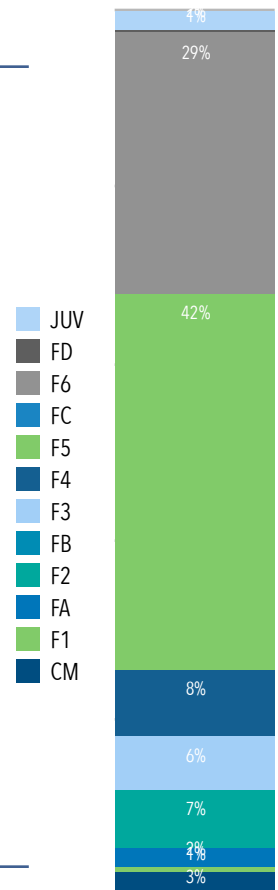
The department received 21 new clients in May:

- 10 Level 6 Felonies
- 8 High Level Felonies (Lvl 5 & Above)
- 3 Criminal Misdemeanor
- 0 Juvenile GPS Supervision

21 clients successfully completed the program, while 7 clients were returned to either the Cass or Pulaski County Jail on a pending violation, with 11 held in the CCJ on pending violations.

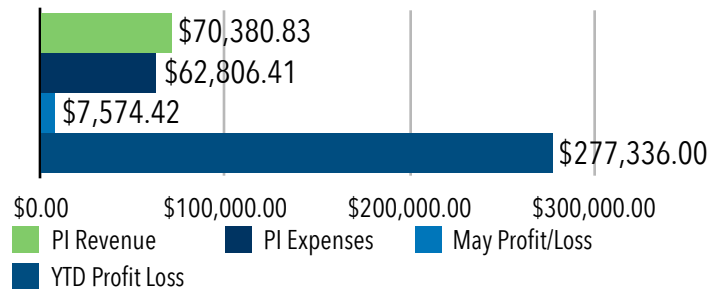

WORK RELEASE UPDATES:

There presently are 35 work release residents, a 16% increase: 27 males and 8 females. Next month, with our new collaboration with PAK, will be starting a second cohort of Men and Women's DBT and a new Seeking Safety Group, a PTSD, Trauma and Substance Use Course.

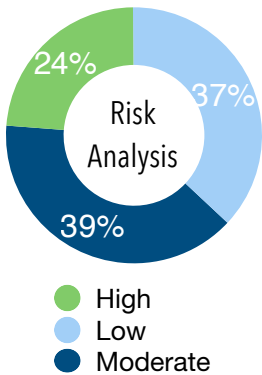


MAY OVERVIEW:

Community Corrections served a total of 173 clients in May, an 6% decrease: 44 via the Work Release Program and 124 via the Home Detention/Electronic Monitoring

POPULATION ANALYSIS:

- 44 Work Release Clients
- 24 Home Detention Clients
- Approximately 15 Clients participated in Work Crew; working on projects including maintaining the flowers and watering & caring for the new garden
- 8 CTP Clients
- 16 Courtesy Transfers
- 145 clients were serving a term originating from Cass County, while 33 were serving a sentence from Pulaski County
- 4 clients participated in Juvenile GPS Monitoring

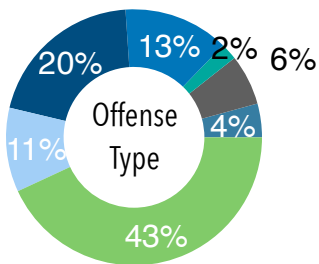


RISK & OFFENSE TYPE ANALYSIS:

Risk Analysis: Analysis shows that 24% of clients served in May were identified through the IRAS Community Supervision Tool or IYAS as High Risk to Very High Risk, 39% as Moderate Risk, and 37% as Low Risk, with an average risk reduction of -10.7%.

Offense Type Analysis:

Analysis shows that 43% of offenses are drug and alcohol related, 11% are traffic offenses, 20% are crimes against persons, 13% property related, 2% weapon related, 6% public health and admin., and 4% fall into the other category.

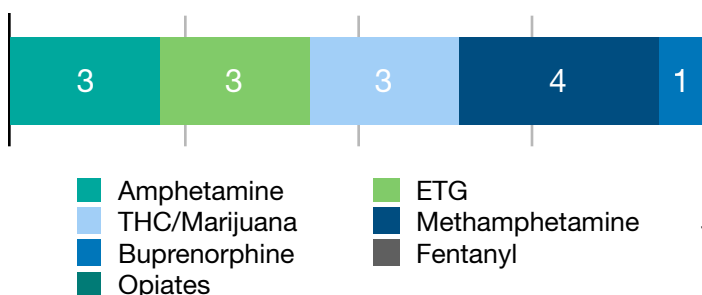

- Other

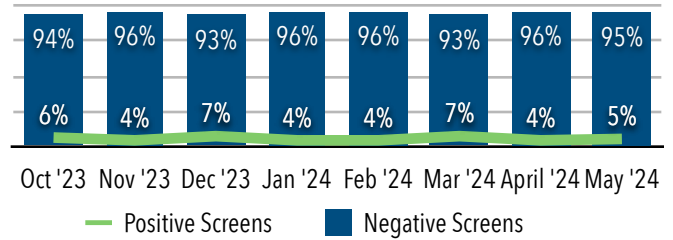
DRUG SCREEN ANALYSIS:

Out of 182 drugs screens administered this month, 5%, were positive. The majority of positive screens were for ETG, Meth/Amp and THC.

Positive Screens by Drug

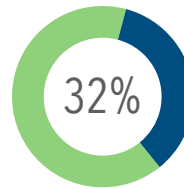


Percent Positive Screens 8 Month Trend

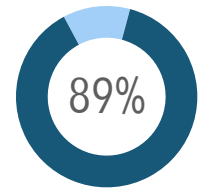


PERFORMANCE METRICS:

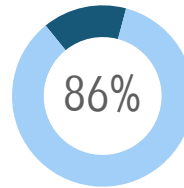
At the direction of our local JRAC, the agency is now tracking the following performance metrics.



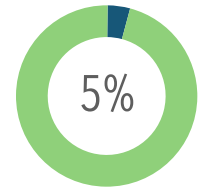
Violation Rate: the percentage of clients who received a violation; pending violations are NOT included; this is a measure of closed cases.



Safety Rate: the percentage of clients who do not commit a new offense while under supervision; this is a measure of closed cases.



Completion Rate: the percentage of clients who remain under supervision until the end of their sentence.



Drug Screen Positivity Rate: the percentage of drug screens administered that return a positive result

NOTABLE UPDATES:

- This month staff are working on their Motivational Interviewing (MI) Certifications from ACJI (Alliance For Community And Justice Innovation), funded by Court Services, to improve their communication skills.
- Our CY25 County Budgets are being prepared, along with our mid-year cost savings analysis.
- IDOC Grant Award Announcements are expected July 19th 2024 for both the Community Corrections Grants and Pretrial Services.
