
Monthly Clients Served 9 Month Trend

WORK RELEASE UPDATES:

There currently are 37 work release residents: 31 males and 6 females, a 10% decrease from last month. Office renovations are complete with case managers currently transitioning to their new space and the finishing touches are being put on installing the technology for the virtual classroom.



AUGUST OVERVIEW:

Community Corrections served a total of 170 clients in August: 51 via the Work Release Program and 120 via the Home Detention/Electronic Monitoring Program for a total of 4,510 days supervised. It is noted that 17 clients have been transferred to other jurisdictions for supervision. The average daily Work Release Population was 46, while the average for Home Detention was 90.

The department received 19 new clients in August:

- 11 Level 6 Felonies
- 7 High Level Felonies (Lvl 5 & Above)
- 1 Criminal Misdemeanors
- 1 Juvenile GPS Supervision

11 clients successfully completed the program, while 7 clients were returned to either the Cass or Pulaski County Jail on a pending violation, with 12 held in the CCJ on pending violations.

- 3 clients participated in Juvenile GPS Monitoring





RISK & OFFENSE TYPE ANALYSIS:


Risk Analysis: Analysis shows that 22% of clients served in August were identified through the IRAS Community Supervision Tool or IYAS as High Risk to Very High Risk, 54% as Moderate Risk, and 22% as Low Risk, with an average risk reduction of -34%.

DRUG SCREEN ANALYSIS:

Out of 164 drugs screens administered this month, 5%, were positive. The majority of positive screens were for amp/meth & ETG (Alcohol).









PERFORMANCE METRICS:

At the direction of our local JRAC, the agency is now tracking the following performance metrics.



Violation Rate: the percentage of clients who received a violation; pending violations are NOT included; this is a measure of closed cases.



Completion Rate: the percentage of clients who remain under supervision until the end of their sentence.



Safety Rate: the percentage of clients who do not commit a new offense while under supervision; this is a measure of closed cases.



Drug Screen Positivity Rate: the percentage of drug screens administered that return a positive result

NOTABLE UPDATES:

- CPCC continues to partner with Court Services on the JPAR SIM Grant to seek funding for therapeutic services and award notices are expected this month.
 We will also further collaborate on future grants and supervision improvements from BJA.
- CPCC will partner further with Court Services to expand therapeutic interventions and will host a Skill Building Learning Team later this month.
- To further save costs, we transitioned to the NIC eLearning Training Platform for all staff.
