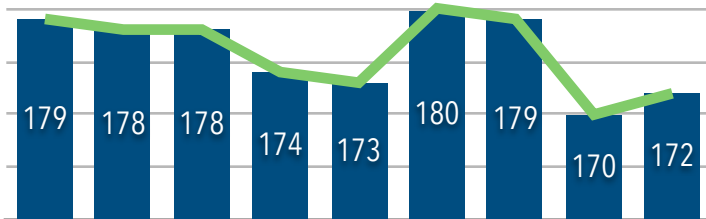

WORK RELEASE UPDATES:

We currently have 39 work release residents, an 11% increase: 35 males and 4 females. While we are excited to have reopened the Women's Dorm, capacity remains limited at this time until renovations are complete. Interior renovations continue in both existing classrooms, isolation cells, computer lab and therapy rooms, with office space remodels set to begin in the coming weeks with a projected renovation completion date of July 1st. Exterior improvements completed include repavement of the parking lot.



MAY OVERVIEW:

Community Corrections served a total of 172 clients in May: 32 via the Work Release Program and 140 via the

Home Detention/Electronic Monitoring program for a total of 4,690 days supervised.

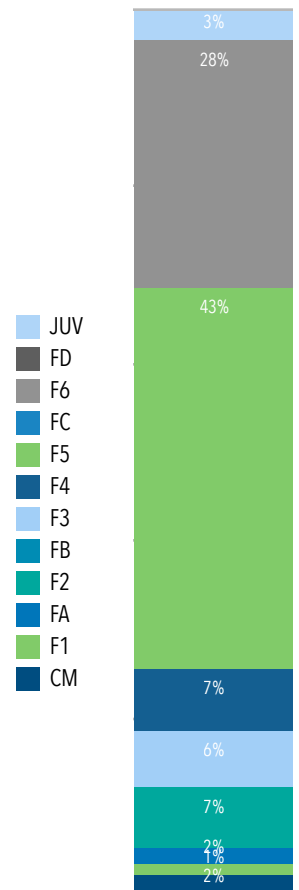
The department received 25 new clients in May:

- 9 Level 6 Felonies
- 13 High Level Felonies (Lvl 5 & Above)
- 1 Criminal Misdemeanors
- 2 Juvenile Supervision

26 clients successfully completed the program, while 2 client were returned to either the Cass or Pulaski County Jail on a pending violation, with 11 held in the CCJ on pending violations.

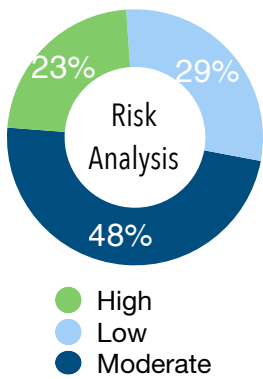

POPULATION ANALYSIS:

- 32 Work Release Clients
- 140 Home Detention Clients
- Approximately 15 Clients participated in Work Crew; working on projects including watering and trash removal
- 7 CTP Clients
- 30 Courtesy Transfers
- 120 clients were serving a term originating from Cass County, while 37 were serving a sentence from Pulaski County
- 6 clients participated in Juvenile GPS Monitoring

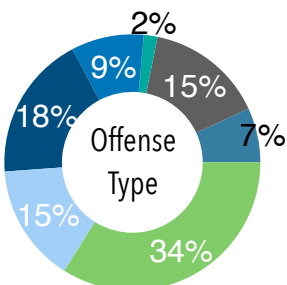


RISK & OFFENSE TYPE ANALYSIS:

Risk Analysis: Analysis shows that 23% of clients served in May were identified through the IRAS Community Supervision Tool or IYAS as High Risk to Very High Risk, 48% as Moderate Risk, and 29% as Low Risk, with an average risk reduction of -31.3%.

Offense Type Analysis:

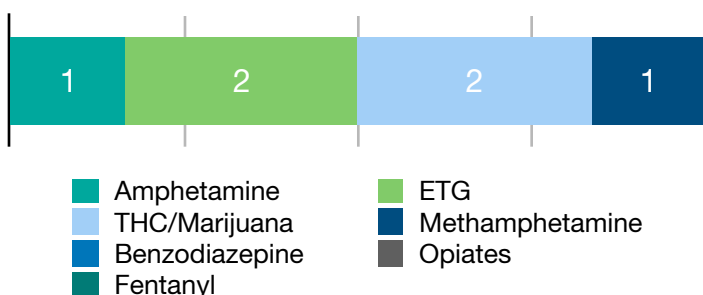
Analysis shows that 34% of offenses are drug and alcohol related, 15% are traffic offenses, 18% are crimes against persons, 9% property related, 2% weapon related, 15% public health and admin., and 7% fall into the other category.



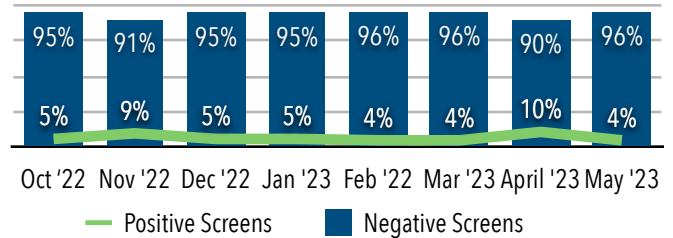
DRUG SCREEN ANALYSIS:

Out of 19 drugs screens administered this month, 4% were positive, a 6% decrease. The majority of positive screens were for ETG & THC.

Positive Screens by Drug

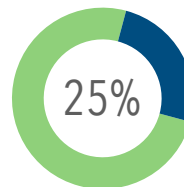


Percent Positive Screens 8 Month Trend

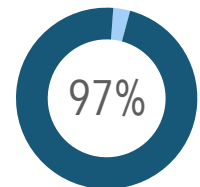


PERFORMANCE METRICS:

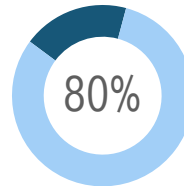
At the direction of our local JRAC the agency is now tracking the following performance metrics.



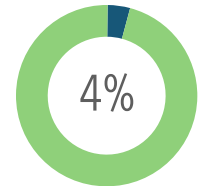
Violation Rate: the percentage of clients who received a violation; pending violations are NOT included; this is a measure of closed cases.



Safety Rate: the percentage of clients who do not commit a new offense while under supervision; this is a measure of closed cases.



Completion Rate: the percentage of clients who remain under supervision until the end of their sentence.



Drug Screen Positivity Rate: the percentage of drug screens administered that return a positive result

NOTABLE UPDATES:

- On May 24th the Department underwent its IDOC Programming CSA Audit. Formal results will be released in the coming months, but early areas identified as needing improvement include increased skill building and program participation. The Department will undergo the Work Release Facility Audit in July.
- CPCC continues to partner with Court Services on the JPAR SIM Grant Application and Justice Counts Project.
